Principles of Aerial Photography for More Powerful Images

The first intriguing thing about aerial shots is the possibility to have unique viewpoints that can only be taken from above the ground. For instance, a photographer may go up to reveal connections between various objects or take a low-angle shot to add depth and emphasize the subject.

Composition becomes a really crucial issue when taking photos from above. Roads, bridges, buildings, coasts and lands can form natural lines directing the eye to certain objects. Repetitive objects may help form a pattern, whereas spaces in between subjects may create negative spaces for the focal point. It is not necessary to fill all parts of the frame but, on the contrary, leave some space around the focal point making it more noticeable.

It is essential to consider the perspective of the shot based on its purpose. Sometimes top-down perspective will work best in case you want to capture symmetry and geometry, sometimes an angle perspective will add depth to the photo. The slightest shift of the position of the camera will change the whole balance of the composition.

Finally, there is one more technique worth considering – the inclusion of elements establishing scale. Various people, vehicles, trees, and buildings can help

This technique is especially helpful when the subject of creation does not exist at the moment. Lighting and camera path can be also adjusted to achieve the desirable effect without waiting for the appropriate conditions in real world. Choosing the Right Height and Angle

The height of an image can have a dramatic impact on the emotions experienced by viewers. A very high camera height can give a sense of size and geography, whereas a low one will make the structure look more significant.

There is no specific height that suits every object. A large-scale construction project might need a broader view in order to emphasize its whole area. In the case of a luxurious hotel, a photographer needs to find the right balance between an object and the landscape that surrounds it.

Angle is another very important aspect that needs to be considered. Straight images may make aerial photographs look graphic. A slanted angle will make the image look more cinematic, as viewers can perceive the details, shadow and depth.

The process of trying out different views is important, but it should be purposeful. Instead of getting a number of random images, a photographer needs to think about what a particular angle will say. For instance, when it comes to showing size, you should zoom out.

Using Natural Light to Shape the Scene

Lighting plays an important role in aerial photography. The same place could be photographed with totally different lighting in the morning, at noon, and during sunset.

Lower angle of the sun provides longer shadows and thus shows more textures and volumes of buildings, mountains, and landscape elements. The softer morning and evening light will also provide the more atmospheric effect.

At noon the light will be stronger and will cause harder shadows. Though it could be not very good to photograph many things at noon, it could fit perfectly for the project requiring sharper shadows.

The weather should also be taken into account. The cloudy sky will soft the sun and will minimize the effect of the light highlights, while the changeable weather conditions will allow creating the dramatic sky scenes. But bad visibility, wind, and rains will affect the photo results negatively and even will influence the safety during the flight.

Professional approach requires preliminary check of the conditions and planning the photography according to the sun position.

Creating Movement That Feels Natural

While aerial video may help energize the campaign, one must always keep in mind that all movement must tell a story. Good aerial movements can help gradually reveal places and keep audiences engaged without making the footage unpleasant to watch.

A rising movement can help viewers see the magnitude of buildings and landscapes. A movement towards the viewer can help reveal the subject of interest. Finally, a lateral movement can help gradually reveal the subject that wasn't seen before.

Sometimes rapid movements may work for content that focuses on action, but one must use them with caution. Rapid movements, changing directions and unnecessary motion may distract viewers from the central subject of the scene.

Well-made aerial cinematography always appears simple as it has been thoroughly planned. In addition, the movement must happen because of the story, not because it is possible.
